CONVENTIONS

1. This Constitution is to be regarded as a general guide for the operation of National Square Dance Conventions in Australia.

2. NAME. The name of the Convention shall be called the Australian National Square Dance Convention.

3. ADVISORY COMMITTEE: The convenor of the last Conventions in Brisbane, Newcastle, Sydney, Melbourne and Adelaide shall be regarded as the Advisory Committee. This committee shall be altered as and when desired by a majority vote of the committee. It is the duty of the Advisory Committee to advise the Convention Committee on matters pertaining to the holding of the Convention.

4. BIDS FOR THE HOLDING OF CONVENTIONS:

(a) Any city or area in Australia or New Zealand may bid for the privilege of holding a Convention. This bid must be submitted to the second convention prior to the year in which it is intended to hold the convention. It shall be made at the business session of the convention being held that year, and shall be submitted by a spokesman for that city or area.

(b) Should the meeting approve of the venue, it is the duty of the spokesman to prepare details for approval at the subsequent Convention.

5. TIME OF HOLDING CONVENTION: Conventions shall be held yearly. It is the sole responsibility of the area or city selected to nominate the time and duration of the Convention. However, it shall not be held closer than eight (8) months to the previous Convention.

6. ELECTION OF CONVENTION COMMITTEE: (a) Within two months after the

previous convention the spokesman shall cause to be advertised and hold a public meeting of square dancers within the area for the purpose of electing a Convention Committee.

(b). This Convention Committee may consist of callers and/or dancers. It shall be made up of as many members and sub-committees as desired, but shall include the following:— 1. Convention Convenor and/or Chairman; 2. Convention Secretary; 3. Convention Treasurer; 4. Accommodation Manager; 5. Publicity Manager.

The duties of the above people are as follows:—

7. (1). CONVENTION CHAIRMAN: Shall organise and generally preside over all facets of the Convention.

(2). CONVENTION SECRETARY: Shall handle all correspondence pertaining to the Convention.

In addition, the Secretary shall receive from the previous Convention Secretary the records of all previous Conventions. The Secretary shall be responsible for the safe-keeping of those records and shall present these, together with complete records of that particular Convention, to the Secretary of the Convention following.

(3). CONVENTION TREASURER: Shall handle all financial matters and on completion present a properly-audited set of books. This set of books shall explain how funds were raised and distributed or otherwise dealt with. Receipts shall be issued for moneys received and paid.

(4) ACCOMMODATION MANAGER: Shall handle all facets of accommodation, transport and other like matters for visitors.

(5). PUBLICITY MANAGER. Shall make every endeavour to publicise the Convention throughout the country.

8. REPORT & BALANCE-SHEET: Within three months after the completion of the Convention the Chairman shall cause to be held a public meeting of square dancers at which a complete report of the Convention, together with a balance sheet and any recommendations deemed necessary shall be submitted. A copy of this report, balance-sheet and any recommendations shall be presented for approval during the business session of the following Convention.

9. DISTRIBUTION OF PROFITS: (a) Should the Convention be run at a profit the funds so raised may be expended in either or all of the following ways:

(1). General promotion of square dancing in that State.

(2). General betterment of square dancing in that State.

3. Allocated in part or whole as capital for the next convention to be held. (b). The funds shall not be used for the gain of any one or more individuals, except where square dancing as a whole benefits. Funds shall not be given to any individual or organisation not connected with square dancing without the prior approval of a Convention General Meeting.

10. REGISTRATION: The committee shall cause to be registered every visitor to the Convention Register Book and shall issue to every person registered a card with his/her name thereon, together with some means of State or Country identification.

11. PROGRAMME: The programme for a convention shall be left to the discretion

of the organising committee. However, the committee shall always include the following essentials:

(a) A square dance hall. (b) A time allowance for the demonstration of new ideas from each area. (c) A time allocation for the presentation of new callers from each area. In this regard, an authority in each State shall approve of the quality of the caller before he is permitted to be included on the programme. (d) A seminar for callers only. (e) A series of lectures, debates or talks on aspects affecting the operation of square dancing. (f) A meeting of State Editors and Co-ordinating Editor of the Australian Square Dance Review. (g) A general meeting. The business of the general meeting shall be as follows: (1) Welcome by Convention Chairman. (2) Reading of minutes of previous general meeting. (3) Reading of reports from previous Convention. (4) Reading of reports from each area or state or country from which representatives are present. (5) Confirmation of Convention to be held one year hence. (6) Acceptance of bid for the Convention to be held two years hence, and voting thereon. (7) Special Business. This shall consist of motions submitted in writing three weeks prior to the Convention. (8) General Business. This shall consist of recommendations only. They may be submitted from the floor.

The Constitution will be submitted for approval at the next Convention to be held in Newcastle. All square dancers in Australia are asked to read this Constitution so that everyone will fully understand what we will be voting for at the Convention.

All S.A. callers are now using canned music. After several discussions in the Review last year (Live Music v. Canned Music), I feel I must back down on a lot I have said about canned music.

I have just come to realise some advantages canned music can have.

1. There is never the worry of wondering whether or not the band is going to turn up.—not that it ever happened to me.

2. A learners' class can be run with a lot smaller group of dancers than it can with live music as all that must be outlaid is the hire of the hall with no band fees.

3. If it suits the caller to do a dance, local or country, he does not have to check with the band to see if it's O.K. with them.

4. A caller can practice all day every day in his own home and keep up with all recent releases without putting a lot more work into it.

Mind you, I still like live music. A thing I still have in favour of it is presentation and I'm sure Colin Huddleston agrees. But there are not enough people coming into square dancing nowadays to worry about presentation, so from now on it's all the way with canned music for S.A.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to my band: John Beal (piano), Les Bennet (bass), and Malcolm Doyle (guitar) for all the help and assistance they have given to me over my years of calling. I do hope you will continue with us, only now as dancers instead of in the band, although from time to time I do hope we can get together again at cabarets and one night dances which often come up in S.A.
